Generous donation supports 3-D project

With the combined efforts of Shoppers Drug Mart, its store teams and customers, Parry Sound is getting closer to acquiring 3-D technology for the local Mammography Unit. The Shoppers Love You, Growing Women's Health fundraising campaign raised more than \$1,448 in 2016 for the West Parry Sound Health Centre Foundation.

With over 1,300 Shoppers Drug Mart/
Pharmaprix stores across Canada participating in the four-week campaign, the 15th annual Growing Women's Health campaign will provide support to more than 500 Canadian women's health charities. National in scope yet locally based, the Growing Women's Health campaign offers patients, customers and employees the opportunity to donate directly to charitable organizations to ensure that resources and programming are available to meet the needs of Canadian women.

In Parry Sound, the donations by local Shoppers Drug Mart customers and employees at 90 Bowes Street benefit West Parry Sound Health Centre's Mammography Unit.

The donations will be added to the Foundation's account for our local Mammography Unit to help acquire ground-breaking 3-D mammography technology (tomosynthesis DBT) enhancing the performance of the unit.

With DBT, an X-ray beam sweeps in an approximate arc of 15 to 50 degrees across the breast, and an electronic detector digitally captures between nine and 25 X-ray projection images. The data from these projections are used

in computer algorithms to reconstruct a series of parallel thin "slices" (tomographic images) corresponding to 0.5 mm to 1 mm intervals through the breast.

The slices create a three-dimensional volume of data that represents the breast's tissue structures enhancing diagnostics.

This new technology is \$140,000.

"The success of the 2016 Growing Women's Health campaign can be attributed to the support and commitment of our loyal customers and staff," said BiQi (Becky) He.





Ball hockey tournament supports improved patient care

The 2017 Mosey & Mosey Youth Ball Hockey Tournament, chaired by WPSHC Board Vice-chair Tom Shultz, is helping our OR and getting us ready to connect through Electronic Health Records.

In 2017 revenues will be buying a \$14,000 timing gateway to sync our anesthetic machines (bought by donors in 2013) with the accompanying transport monitors. The timing gateway is used in our Operating Room and is critical both for patient safety and our eventual tie-in to the new Electronic Health Records (EHR) system.

Without this gateway, patient blood pressures and other information could not be transported to the provincial repository of patient records.

Our hospital is one of eight in the 154 hospitals in Ontario that does not have EHR. The Foundation has secured \$988,000 of the first million in \$10 million needed to install a working EHR system.

Digestive Woes: Eek! What's causing all this gas?



Belinda

Meet Belinda. She is fighting with an embarrassing problem — excess gas. She burps a lot and often feels gassy and bloated. She wants to solve her problem, but is not sure where to start. After some online research and opinions from friends, she thinks a gluten-free diet may help, but isn't sure. She tries the three-step approach:

Spot the problem.

Belinda says: "Everything I eat seems to give me gas — my friend says to stop eating wheat and gluten. Will that help me?"

Get the facts.

After reading a medical website, Belinda learns that gas, bloating and burping may be caused by:

- Swallowed air
- · Certain food or drinks
- Medicines
- Supplements

She is relieved to learn that gas, bloating and burping are all common and can be normal. She also notes that they can be the sign of a condition, such as lactose intolerance, irritable bowel syndrome or celiac disease. She is unsure of the reason for her symptoms, and reads that it's important not to self-diagnose.

- Digestive woes are unique to the person who is having the issues. Self-diagnosing, without the care and support of a dietitian, can lead to unnecessary food and nutrient restriction. Don't miss out on amazing nutritious food if you don't have to!

Get the facts (cont'd).

She needs the help of her doctor or dietitian.

She wants to learn more about her friend's suggestion to give up gluten in case she has celiac disease, so she visits the Canadian Celiac Association website (www.celiac.ca). She learns that if she needs to be tested for celiac disease, she needs to be eating gluten (a protein found in wheat and other grains) before the test to get accurate results. If she took her friend's advice to remove gluten from her diet, she could get a "false negative" result.

She also learns that she should work with a dietitian before eliminating foods, since they can help her plan a balanced diet and ensure she meets nutrient needs. She also finds helpful advice by searching the term "gas" on these trusted websites:

Seek suppost.

Now Belinda knows not to self-diagnose or rely solely on advice from the internet or well-meaning friends. She will talk to her doctor about her symptoms. If necessary she will see a gastroenterologist (digestive health doctor). She is eager to see a dietitian to help figure out which foods may be causing her discomfort. She will find support from a dietitian at www.dietitians.ca/find.

If she is diagnosed with a digestive disorder, she learns that there are not-for-profit organizations, which offer support groups where clients can talk to others with the same condition (in meetings or online).

Take the Fight -

Eating should be joyful, not a source of everyday frustration and confusion. If you're fighting with food, try this three-step approach:

1. Spot the problem.

Define what's causing your fight with food first.

2. Get the facts.

Use facts from credible sources to decide what needs to be done to solve the problem.

3. Seek suppost.

Put the plan into action with support from a dietitian, family and friends.


