North East LHIN

Two new members appointed to NE LHIN board

The North East Local Health Integration Network (NE LHIN) has announced two new board members have been appointed to the NE LHIN Board - Lorraine Dupuis, from Sudbury, and Cheryl St-Amour, from Timmins. The members were appointed for a three-year term starting through a provincial Order-in-Council.

"The North East LHIN Board is pleased to welcome exceptional northerners who bring diverse skills and backgrounds," said Board Chair Ron Farrell. "Lorraine brings a wealth of knowledge from her work in the education system as well as previous governance experience and Cheryl's expertise in financial management, accounting, and quality improvement will be an asset to the board in our efforts to help build a more patient-focused health care system in northeastern Ontario."

As a long-time resident of Sudbury, Dupuis is a retired teacher of 33 years with the Sudbury Separate School Board. She has been active on numerous boards and committees, including 10 years as a member of both Science North and the Ontario Film boards.

"Health care is a vital public service that affects all of us," said Dupuis. "I'm looking forward to beginning my work with the NE LHIN board so that we can increase the coordination and sustainability of the system for the benefit of all northerners."

St-Amour, a Certified Management Accountant, currently works as a Plant Systems Support Manager for Ontario Power Generation. She has extensive past experience working in a variety of managerial roles in both the public and private sectors. Her past positions include Northern Development Advisor with the Ministry of Northern Development and Mines, Director of Business Development and Retention with the Timmins Economic Development Corporation, and Director of Corporate Development with the JPL Group of Companies.

"I am excited for the opportunity to serve as a NE LHIN board director and am looking forward to working collaboratively with the governing members of other health service providers across our region," said St. Amour.

- Board members are appointed by an Order-In-Council through a process administered by the Public Appointments Secretariat, for a term of up to three years, and may be reappointed for an additional term or terms to a maximum of six years.
- The chair and board members are appointed based on their expertise, experience, leadership skills and the needs of the LHIN and are accountable, through the chair, to the Minister of Health and Long-Term Care for the LHIN's use of public funds and for its results in the local health system.
- The role of LHIN Board of Directors is to oversee, advise and govern the strategic directions and priorities of the LHIN.
- The NE LHIN Board now includes: Ron Farrell, Chair (Sundridge), Denis Bérubé (Moonbeam), John Febbraro (Sault Ste. Marie), Mark Palumbo (Sudbury), Betty Stone (Temiskaming Shores), Kim Morris (Sudbury), Petra Wall (Spring Bay, Manitoulin), Anne Stewart (Pointe au Baril), Lorraine Dupuis (Sudbury), and Cheryl St-Amour (Timmins).



Safe Surgery Checklist



Guidelines

A safe surgery checklist is used to confirm that safety steps are completed for a surgical procedure performed in the operating room.

Surgical procedures are complex aspects of health services and carry significant risk of potentially avoidable harm. Safe surgery checklists play an important role in improving the safety of surgical procedures. They can reduce the likelihood of complications following surgery and often improve surgical outcomes.

Safe surgery checklists were developed by Canadian Patient Safety Institute and International World Health Organization. Each checklist has three phases.

- 1) Briefing- before induction of anesthesia.
- 2) Time-out-before skin incision.
- 3) Debriefing before patient leaves the operating room.

Test for Compliance

- -The checklist is used for every surgical procedure.
- -The team has agreed on a three-phase safe surgery checklist to be used for surgical procedures performed in the operating room.
- -There is a process to monitor compliance with the checklist.
- -The use of the checklist is evaluated, and results are shared with the team.
- -Results of the evaluation are used to improve the implementation and expand the use of the checklist.

Evidence

- The team includes the surgeon, anaesthesiologist, nurses and patient
- The checklist is completed in order of the three phases listed above.
- The O.R. Circulating Nurse records her initials and the time checked.
- The completed Safe Surgery Checklist is found in the Nurses notes section of the Clinical Record.
- The Operation Report Form is a secondary form that provides confirmation that the surgery checklist was completed. The Operation Report Form is kept on patient's chart.
- Our MLAA Wait times performance chart reporting quarterly results indicates 100% compliance for the safe surgery checklist.

Required Organizational Practices (ROPs) are evidence-informed practices addressing high-priority areas that are central to quality and safety. Accreditation Canada defines an ROP as an essential practice that organizations must have in place to enhance patient safety and minimize risk.

Safety News and Information

Inspecting workplaces to protect workers' health and safety

Ontario is conducting more than two dozen inspection blitzes in 2018-2019 to ensure employers are meeting health, safety and employment standards at workplaces across the province.

Enforcement staff will visit workplaces such as health care organizations, warehouses, "big box" retail, grocery stores, chemical manufacturing plants, pulp and paper mills, hotels, golf courses, mines and construction projects.

In particular, sectors with new and young workers, temporary help, vulnerable workers and a history of low compliance will be targeted.

Occupational health and safety inspectors will look for occupational health and safety violations involving issues such as violence, working at heights, hazardous materials, machine guarding, conveyors, mobile equipment, ergonomics and falls.

The goal will be to raise awareness that safety is everyone's responsibility, to enhance workplace health and safety and to prevent workplace injuries, illnesses and deaths.

- Blitzes and initiatives are part of Ontario's enforcement strategy to increase compliance with the Employment Standards Act, Occupational Health and Safety Act and their regulations.
- Between April 1, 2005 and December 31, 2017, more than \$177 million in wages and other money owed to employees has been recovered through inspections, claims, collections and other program activities.
- Since June 2008, Ministry of Labour occupational health and safety inspectors have conducted more than 792,400 field visits, and 100 provincial inspection blitzes.
- Inspectors have issued more than 1,297,500 compliance orders for safety issues across all sectors in Ontario since June 2008.

Due to health concerns arising from exposure to scented products, West Parry Sound Health Centre has a scent reduction policy aimed at maintaining a safe and healthy environment for all patients, employees, volunteers, and visitors.

Some people who work at, and receive care at, WPSHC report sensitivities to various scented products. We ask for everyone's cooperation in our efforts to accommodate their health concerns. Scented products such as hair spray, perfume, and deodorant can trigger reactions such as respiratory distress and headaches.

In Canada today more than one-in-four individuals suffers from respiratory disease. A full 40 percent of these individuals have allergic triggers to their disease. Medical evidence clearly shows that scented products are harmful to the health of sensitive individuals. In sufficient concentrations, scented products may be harmful to those with allergies, environmental sensitivity or chronic heart or lung disease.
